The most used format is the MLA style when writing an academic paper. In this format, you will not skip lines between the four lines of the initial heading. On every page in the header, you are supposed to write your last name along with the page number in a right justified format. This way, every page would show your last name and page number.

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Double space between the title and the first line of the text. Create a header in the upper right-hand corner that includes your last name, followed by a space with a page number. Number all pages consecutively with Arabic numerals (1, 2, 3, 4, etc.), one-half inch from the top and flush with the right margin.

There are five levels of heading in APA Style. Level 1 is the highest or main level of heading, Level 2 is a subheading of Level 1, Level 3 is a subheading of Level 2, and so on through Levels 4 and 5. The number of headings to use in a paper depends on the length and complexity of the work. If only one level of heading is needed, use Level 1.

Heading level 1 is used for main sections like “ Methods ”, “ Results ”, and “ Discussion ”. There is no “ Introduction ” heading at the beginning of your paper because the first paragraphs are understood to be introductory. Heading level 2 is used for subsections under level 1.

Most undergraduate papers often use only Level 1 headings, which are: centered; boldface; uppercase and lowercase. . include any. A header runs throughout your paper, so that every page is labelled. The header goes in the upper right-hand corner. The first header should appear on the second page of the document and then continue to the end of the document. It should include your last name, followed by just the page number to the right of your last name.

Use double-spacing for the entire essay, including the title headline. Enter the title of the paper with center alignment in the top half of the first page. Write your name on the line below the title. Enter the name of your college on the third line.
