As discussed in my other article about 'Sentence', a simple sentence in English language is a sentence that consists of a single independent clause.

Sentence Structures - grammar

Sentence structure refers to the way in which a sentence is grammatically put together. Sentence structure encompasses a range of elements, including different types of words (verbs, nouns, prepositions), the function each of those words serves (subject, object), punctuation usage, and word order. The rules for sentence structure differ from language to language.

Another definition of "sentence length" is the number of clauses in the sentence, whereas the "clause length" is the number of phones in the clause. Basic English sentence structure. All the parts of speech in English are used to make sentences. All sentences include two parts: the subject and the verb (this is also known as the predicate). The subject is the person or thing that does something or that is described in the sentence. The verb is the action the person or thing takes or the description of the person or thing.
